

#### **Picasso: Hear and Now**

In the Picasso room, we have been doing some mindful tasting. Lemons, limes, pineapples, olives, and hearts of palm are just a few of the things we have mindfully tasted. The children especially enjoyed seeing what a pineapple looks like before it is cut and how delicious it smells once it is cut! The teachers created "smelling work," including vanilla, Indian spices, and lemons.

During circle, we have been practicing our "peace poem" ritual. The children have learned how to be still and breathe slowly

and deeply to be silent in the moment. The coveted jobs are turning off and on the overhead lights and peace candle. These jobs became so popular that we created a chart to ensure every child had a turn to do each job!

#### Miro: Hear and Now

In the Miro class we practice mindfulness by focusing on our breath: breathe in, breathe out. After doing this we often discuss what happens when we get frustrated or angry. We talk about how we can feel big emotions. When we take a breath, it makes the big emotion get a little bit smaller. Next, we take another breath, and the big emotion continues to shrink.

At the same time that we are acknowledging uncomfortable feelings, we want to remember that there are many things to feel good about. We asked the class, what they felt grateful for at that moment. Here were some responses: grateful-for friends, circle time because we're all together, playing with my brother and sister, etc.

We were encouraged to see that most of the children were eager to share both their frustrations and what they were thankful for.

We will continue to breathe through all of our emotions, and we will also remember to include gratitude.

## **Black History Month**

In honor of Black History Month, the Stepping Stones students read the book Saving the Day about Garrett Morgan. He was an African American inventor who invented the traffic signal.

Mrs. Gujral joined the Miro and Van Gogh classes to celebrate Black History Month. She read the book: We All Belong, which celebrates our similarities and differences. She brought skin tone paints, and each child matched their skin tone and used it to create a classroom peace sign. We were left with a beautiful representation of the shades of our class.

# **Celebrating Earth Day**

Earth Day is a special day at Albrook. The students discuss the impact each one has on the health of our planet. Below is feed-

back from some classes and their approach to celebrating our planet Earth. To celebrate Earth Day this year, the older students from Upper Elementary joined the younger students from the Monet classroom for a leisurely nature walk. It was heartwarming to observe the older students gently take the hands of the toddlers and point out some of the wonders of our Children's Garden. Smelling the oregano and basil was a big hit, and there were lots of giggles when the toddlers expressed 'yuck'.

We then slowly walked around the labyrinth and listened to the sounds of nature and the quiet chatter of the beautiful interactions. We ended our celebration by singing Happy Birthday to the Earth. The Miro children did an experiment that involved the germination of a seed. The children choose between peas and beans. The friends observed their seeds developing roots. The children will transfer the seeds to their gardens at home. When they are ready, they will harvest them in the fall and enjoy their grown foods.

The Van Gogh class celebrated Earth Day by reading a book about Earth Day. They had a lesson on what items can go into the recycle container, the compost, and which items we repurpose to reuse in the classroom. The children then wore gloves and went to the soccer field and pool area to clean up any trash they found.













The Homer Class celebrated Earth Day by discovering different things in nature during our scavenger hunt.

In the Matisse class, we celebrated Earth Day on Wednesday, the 10th of April, with a guest speaker, Arnika's mom, who spoke to the children about the importance of recycling and how this is her occupation. She talked about Earth Day and then read the book The Lorax written by Dr. Seuss. She then showed items to be recycled. Mrs. Mastropierro showed how her mother-in-law made bags from plastic bags. Lastly, Arnika's mom used recycled bottles to make lanterns!

In the O'Keeffe class, we celebrated Earth Day by making paper bowls from recycled materials. This project will also double as a gift for Mother's Day.

The Stepping Stones classes read the Earth Book by Todd Parr. We went on a nature walk and collected objects. from nature. We will make a group collage from our findings. The Elementary Expanded Care students planted sunflower seeds for Earth Day. We used cardboard egg cartons as pots for the sunflower seeds. After the sunflowers grow, they will be gifts to go home with the students for Mother's Day.

## **STEAM Workshop**

The Albrook staff had an In-service Day on March 15 in Albers Hall. This workshop was an LSC Professional Development Course directed by Liberty Science Center. The instructor hosted the program from 12:30-3:30 pm, focusing on integrating science investigations, engineering, and design thinking as the teachers explored developing students' creativity, communication, and problem-solving skills.

The elementary teachers felt that the presenter was very good and engaging. The activities were very appropriate for elementary children. The hands on element of the workshop was effective and fun for everyone. Both building a tower and creating a windmill were great ideas and options for our students.

The Albrook preschool teachers enjoyed an afternoon of learning about STEAM principles from a representative from the Liberty science center. It was fun to work with each team to complete the tasks given. It opened the curiosity of the child said the Van Gogh teachers. The O'Keeffe teachers felt that the workshop was a good reminder of how a child learns by having the ability to think outside the box and explore other techniques, while being creative and problem-solving during the workshop, we learn to work as a group and build various structures with limited materials.
